If you are unsure of what Critical Race Theory is all about, we saw a clear example of it in the Tennessee State Legislature last week.

Just days after the Covenant Elementary School shooting in Nashville, passionate students and their families stormed the galleries of their House and Senate chambers to demand gun reform of their elected officials. When the Republican House Speaker would not turn on the microphones of Representatives Gloria Johnson, Justin Jones and Justin Pearson, the proceedings came to a halt when Jones and Pearson led chants through a bullhorn in support of gun reform.

The Republican controlled House responded with an unprecedented decision. They voted to expel the two, black male legislators while allowing the white, female legislator to keep her seat in the House. In a statement shared on social media, Tennessee House Republicans said it was a "sad day" for the state - but they defended the vote as "the only path forward" in response to the Tennessee Three's "disrespectful" actions.

Former President Barack Obama tweeted, "No elected official should lose their job simply for raising their voice - especially when they're doing it on behalf of our children. Silencing those who disagree with us is a sign of weakness, not strength, and it won't lead to progress."

On April 10, the Metro Council of Nashville called a special meeting to fill Jones' seat and unanimously voted to reinstate him. Prior to the vote, Nashville mayor John Cooper said he was "proud" that the council was meeting and would "send [Jones] right back to continue serving his constituents." Representative Justin Pearson expects to be reinstated by his district this week. Both men expressed their intentions to regain their seats on a permanent basis in upcoming special elections for those positions.

The Kaiser Family Foundation, an independent research organization for health, polling and news, released the following key findings about gun-related incidents in the United States (April, 2023):

- (21%) of U.S. adults say they have personally been threatened with a gun.
- (19%) say a family member was killed by a gun (including death by suicide).
- (17%) have witnessed someone being shot.
- (4%) have personally shot a gun in self-defense.
- (4%) have been injured in a shooting

In total, about half (54%) of all U.S. adults say they or a family member have had one of the above gun-related experiences.

Gun reform activist and survivor of the Parkland School shooting in 2018, David Hogg, spoke at Alma College last fall. The audience was inspired by his passion and powerful words when he said, "To those politicians that say change will not come, I say we will not stop until every man, every woman, every child, every American can live without fear of gun violence. To that I say, 'No More'!"

Three bills related to gun reform passed in the Michigan Senate last week. The bills, which expand background checks, require safe storage and establish a red flag law, were passed along party lines. These proposals will now go to the House, where a similar proposal for expanded background checks was passed last week. Gov. Gretchen Whitmer said she will sign the legislation if it reaches her desk. Michigan Democrats Deliver!

Our work as a nation will not be done until state and federal lawmakers who refuse to end gun violence are voted out of office because the citizens they represent had the courage to speak as loud as the Tennessee Three this last week.

A conference to commemorate and learn from the poisoning of Michigan

Thursday, May 18 – Saturday, May 20, 2023 Alma College | Alma, MI

From May 18–20, a coalition of groups and institutions (Alma College, Central Michigan University and Emory University as well as the Pine River Superfund Citizen Task Force and U.S. EPA) are hosting *The PBB Disaster at 50: A Conference to Commemorate and Learn from the Poisoning of Michigan.* The conference will bring the critical lessons of the disaster back into public discussion and consciousness, with the hope it will inspire continued action to address long-term environmental and human health outcomes and behaviors.

However, as the recent national media (NY Times, CNN and National Public Radio) attention to St. Louis and the PBB disaster shows, we mostly want to hold the conference to help others see the lessons from the local experience.

As you may know, in May, 1973, the Michigan Chemical Company in St. Louis, Michigan, accidentally shipped a flame retardant made of polybrominated biphenyl (PBB) to a livestock feed mill, where it was mixed into animal feed. At least 8 million people in Michigan consumed PBB in milk, cheese, eggs and meat. Researchers continue to identify health problems connected to the exposure, and St. Louis has three Superfund sites still contaminated with PBB and other hazardous chemicals.

In addition to a number of presentations by nationally recognized environmental and human health experts, historians, and creative artists, the conference will offer the following activities:

- 1. touring one or more farms quarantined as a result of PBB
- 2. visiting the St. Louis Superfund sites led by US EPA experts
- 3. screening the BBC film *The Poisoning of Michigan*, with comments from participants
- 4. observing a continuing PBB health screening by experts from Emory University
- 5. a luncheon on Saturday, May 20 honoring a group of nominated "PBB Heroes"

While the conference is free, we need you to go to the conference website to register so we can plan seating. There will be a livestream of the proceedings and recordings of sessions made available after the conclusion of the conference.

The Next Chapter: A Book Club

And There Was Light: Abraham Lincoln and the American Struggle

On Saturday, March 4, 2023 we met to discuss Jon Meacham's book. With over 15,000 books about our sixteenth president already published, why did Jon Meacham choose to write yet another? Well, he develops several main insights that he wishes to contribute to the ongoing conversation about Lincoln, one of which is the relevance and timeliness of the politics and divisiveness of the 1850s and 1860s to America since 2016.

The main thrust of this volume is to make coherent the whole history of Lincoln's thoughts on slavery from his teen years until his assassination. While some have seen in the record inconsistencies or hypocrisies, Meacham lays out his argument (with ample evidence—some in our group thought perhaps too much evidence) that Lincoln's view of slavery evolved over time as circumstances changed. The ethic of Meacham's Lincoln is fairness: "As I would not be a slave, so I would not be a master".

Several participants commented that while reading *And There Was Light*, they saw parallels between the age of Lincoln and today's combat in the public media between the powers of democracy and oligarchy. Members who participated rated the book an average of 4.8 out of 5. All agreed that Meacham's depth of research is impressive. I personally am relieved that I don't have to read the other 15,000 books now.

The Dictionary of Lost Words

We met to discuss Pip Williams' book on April 1, 2023. This piece of historical fiction is a meticulously researched novel about the process of collecting words for the first edition of the Oxford English Dictionary, but also includes the contributions of women in the collection, which has been previously left out. The main character, Esme, as a small child watching the men sort words for the dictionary, begins her own collection of words discarded by the men.

Our book club members discussed some of the broader themes touched on by the book including representation (or lack thereof by women, the working class, spoken words not found in books), the power of words, and the immense undertaking of cataloging all of the words in the English language. The book also touches on the suffrage movement and the effects of World War I on families in England.

We rated the book a 5 out of 5 stars. We felt that the author did an amazing job interweaving historical facts and events with a believable fictional main character.

Our May book club read is *The Cold Vanish* by Jon Billman. All of these books are available at Ballyhoo Books in Alma.




